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ARTH 500* (if you have an MA in Art History from UNM within 5 years you may be able to waive this requirement in consultation with faculty)

All course work offered toward degree requirements must fall within a five-year period.

Course Work:

All coursework applied to the degree must be graduate level (courses numbered 500 and above). The student must take at least 21 credits of coursework at UNM, of which at least 18 must be taken after admission to the Ph.D. program (exclusive of dissertation hours).

To receive the Ph.D. degree, the student must demonstrate a general mastery of the discipline, comprehensive knowledge of their field of specialization, and an ability to conduct original research. Required course work done outside the Department of Art will be determined by the student's particular research interests and with the advice and approval of the faculty advisor.

Transfer Credits:

Credit hours previously applied to a master's degree from UNM, or another accredited institution may be applied toward the Ph.D. These courses must be approved by the Art History faculty.

Graduate Symposium:

In your third semester, you are required to participate in the *Graduate Symposium*, a conference-style presentation given to faculty and department peers of a research paper produced within the previous year in the program. Students must select a paper topic in the spring semester of their first year in the program. Students must identify a faculty mentor with whom they will work on the paper by the end of April in the spring semester of their first year in the program. At that time, the student must fill out the Symposium Application Form and get two faculty members' signatures on the application, before submitting it to the Graduate Office.

Students will work on their paper with guidance from their mentor in spring and summer. Students must submit a draft of the complete paper to their mentor one month before the symposium for feedback and to have adequate time to revise. The symposium evaluation is conducted by the art history



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faculty. The faculty will evaluate the student's performance based on the clarity of ideas, the thesis, and the argument, as well as the effectiveness of the presentation and responses to audience Q&A. All PhD students must pass one symposium before enrolling in dissertation hours. If a student does not pass their symposium requirement, they will be allowed a make-up presentation at the following scheduled symposium.

Language Requirement:

All PhD students must provide evidence of proficiency in two languages other than English, appropriate to your area of concentration, by the time of advancement to doctoral candidacy. Students should choose their languages in consultation with their faculty advisor, and the language must be relevant to research in the field. To satisfy the language requirement, you can apply 4 semesters of coursework from your bachelor's degree or take coursework at UNM through the 2120 course (or Intermediate level), proficiency in a second language (native speaker, international coursework conducted in the second language), or pass a department-approved language exam.

Doctoral Comprehensive Exam:

This written examination, administered by the student's Committee on Studies, tests the student's comprehensive knowledge of the field of specialization. The exam consists of questions from three faculty members on the student's committee. You have one week to complete a minimum of 10-page response to each question, with appropriate references and citations.

Application for Candidacy – UNM form must be filed the same semester you pass the Comprehensive Exam.

Advancement to Candidacy:

Students are Advanced to Candidacy by the Dean of Graduate Studies in the semester when the following requirements are met:

- Approved Application for Candidacy (Office of Graduate Studies)
- Passed Doctoral Comprehensive Exam
- Completed language requirements

The Art History Program considers a PhD student ABD/ All but Dissertation and Advanced to Candidacy when these additional requirements are met:

- Passed ARTH 500
- Completed all course requirements
- Passed the Graduate Art History Symposium
- Have submitted an approved dissertation proposal



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The Dissertation Process:

Dissertation Proposal:

No later than one semester after passing the Comprehensive Exam, Ph.D. candidates will submit their dissertation proposal to their dissertation chair for review before submitting it to their Committee on Studies. The dissertation proposal will be developed in consultation with the dissertation advisor. Proposals may include discussions of Methodology, Research Questions, Literature Review, Chapter Breakdown, Completion Timeline.

Dissertation:

The dissertation demonstrates your ability to undertake original research and to write a readable, scholarly argument of book length. You are expected to have complete knowledge of the historical, critical, theoretical, and methodological issues raised by the subject. You must submit a dissertation that demonstrates evidence of your ability to do sound research. Your topic and methodology must have the approval of your Dissertation Committee. It is your responsibility to provide each member of your committee with a complete draft of your dissertation in ample time for review before your final defense.

Oral Defense of Dissertation:

It is your responsibility to schedule a defense of your dissertation in an oral examination administered by your Dissertation Committee.

Time Limit to Complete Requirements:

You have five years to complete the dissertation research and writing from the date you pass your comprehensive exams. Under *extenuating circumstances*, you may request an extension of this timeline, but it must be done prior to the end of the time limit.



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Funding and Tuition: Assistantships, Scholarships, and Links:

All admitted students are given the opportunity (*after admission*) to apply for Graduate Assistantships (GA). Assistantships entail 10 hours/week assisting instructors in an introductory art history course. Assistantships also include a monthly stipend, as well as 6 hours of paid tuition, additional hours billed at the in-state rate, and free health insurance.

Assistantships are awarded each semester on a competitive basis and funding is not guaranteed.

You cannot apply for an assistantship until you have been admitted to the program. All Ph.D. students are eligible for up to 10 semesters of departmental funding. Expected completion of the Ph.D. degree is 6 to 8 years. Ph.D. students are expected to apply for internal and external grants and fellowships, especially once they are ABD.

With an assistantship covering 6 hours, and the rest billed at the in-state rate, a student taking 9 hours can expect to pay the remaining tuition balance each semester out of pocket or with external funding.
