((3 credits) Formerly ARTE 214) Understanding the art process as it relates to the growth and development of children. Experiences, methods and curriculum for art education in the elementary school.

(3 credits) Philosophical, psychological, theoretical, and practical concepts about teaching art in elementary school, including observation and teaching in field-lab. Screening course requiring a minimum grade of "B-" for admission into the Art Education program. Prerequisite: 3 credit hours in ARTH and 12 credit hours in ARTS.

ARTE 325 <u>Studio Methods, Materials, and Modifications</u>

(3 credits) Offered with ARTE 525, 439, and 539. This course examines university-level studio artistic processes and determines how those processes can be reworked and implemented in a developmentally appropriate approach for early childhood to adult learning situations.

(3 credits) Offered with ARTE 530, 465, and 565. Creativity, Growth, Development, and the Exceptional Art Student examines pedagogical frameworks and developmental theories from educational psychology, learning sciences, creativity studies, and social theory within the context of visual art education. The course concentrates on developing a practical, actionable understanding of growth, development, and creativity; prepares students with philosophies and pedagogies in differentiated instruction; and introduces viable modifications and accommodations for exceptional learners in visual art education. In addition to on-campus coursework, students participate in group site visits to locations where visual art is taught through differentiated approaches, and research/generate a series of three case studies of learners at different points in their development.

(3 credits) (Formerly ARTH 101) This course is geared toward non-majors to build visual literacy skills and introduce the discipline of art history. Through lectures examining works of art and visual culture from diverse global contexts, this course will investigate several themes and questions: What is art and who gets to define it? How and why does art or visual culture exist? How does art function in specific cultural and historical contexts? How do we understand what art means? What tools do we need to understand and analyze the diverse visual materials in our lives and around the world? How do art historians contextualize and discuss art and visual culture in temporal and social terms? Students should understand that this class is not about validating subjective likes or dislikes, or even differentiating between "good" versus "bad" art, but instead is designed to teach the basic tools and practices for analyzing the visual images that permeate our lives. Through both course lectures and first-hand engagements with works of art and visual culture, students will learn how to evaluate evidence and visual information, situate works of art in cultural and historic contexts, and apply basic art historical methods of visual analysis. The lectures and assignments in this class will enable students to look at, write about, and discuss works of art in a critical and thoughtful manner beyond personal preferences. This course meets the requirements for the fine arts credit under the NMHED general education guidelines.

ARTH 2110 History of Art I

Sec 001 CRN 52846 TBD TR 9:30-10:45 CTRART 1020

(3 credits) (Formerly ARTH 201) This survey course explores the art and architecture of ancient pre-historic cultures through the end of the fourteenth century. Focused on art from diverse global contexts, this course will provide insights into the artworks of global cultures in order to provide alternate views of art and history. Emphasis will be placed on the relationship of artworks to political, social, spiritual, intellectual, and cultural movements that affect and are affected by their creation and development. Through both course lectures and first-hand engagements with works of art and visual culture, students will learn how to evaluate evidence and visual information, situate works of art in cultural and historic contexts, and apply basic art historical methods of visual analysis. This course meets the requirements for the fine arts credit under the NMHED general education guidelines.

ARTH 2120 History of Art II

(3 credits) (Formerly ARTH 202) This survey course will explore the architecture, sculpture, ceramics, paintings, drawings, and glass objects from the fourteenth century to the modern era. Focused on art from diverse global contexts, this course will provide insights into the artworks of global cultures in order to provide alternate views of art and history. Emphasis will be placed on the relationship of artworks to political, social, spiritual, intellectual, and cultural movements that affect and are affected by their creation and development. Through both course lectures and first-hand engagements with works of art and visual culture, students will learn how to evaluate evidence and visual information, situate works of art in cultural and historic contexts, and apply basic art historical methods of visual analysis. This course meets the requirements for the fine arts credit under the NMHED general education guidelines.

ARTH 310 Global Photographies

(3 credits) (Formally ARTH 250) An examination of photography from a global perspective, this course sketches the role the medium has played as an engine of globalization. The course focuses on photography from Africa, the Middle East, Asia and Oceania.

ARTH 322 Medieval Art 1000-1400CE: Reliquaries and Cathedrals

(3 credits) Survey of the visual cultures (architecture, luxury objects, book illumination and illustration) of the Medieval World, including northern and Mediterranean Europe and the Islamic World, from 1000 to 1200 CE.

ARTH 351

Artistic Traditions of the South West

Sec 001 CRN 79096

CTRART 2018

(3 credits) This course is an introduction to the diverse artistic traditions of the Southwest, with heavy emphasis on the art history of New Mexico. Starting with the art and architecture of ancestral Pueblo peoples, we will examine the visual cultures of Indo-Hispano/Spanish Colonial, Euro-American, and several Native communities, from the archaeological past to the present. By examining textiles, ceramics, architecture, painting, photography, and other art forms, students will learn how the unique cultural and historical contexts of New Mexico shape artistic production, and learn critical thinking skills and art historical methodologies that enable us to understand the cause and effect relationships between works of art and the socio-historic circumstances of their production. Works of art and visual culture are always communicative and political, especially when they claim not to be, so a central theme of this class is investigating the roles that arts fulfill both within specific communities as well as the ways that art and visual culture has been impacted by intercultural contact and colonial conflict. By the end of the course, students will be able to talk about the wide variety of arts of the Southwest in a critical, analytical manner, and will demonstrate an understanding of the relationships between visuality and socio-historic contexts.

ARTH 379

American Art 1876-1940

Sec 001 CRN 79097 Buick TR 2:00-3:15 CTRART 1020

(3 credits) Offered with ARTH 579. This class will explore the rise of mass media and popular culture, against which the fine arts attempted to defend itself or to embrace and appropriate; also, we will explore the consuming questions around Indigenous people, immigration, migration, and citizenship as defined by Jim Crow. We will track the development and rise of feature films; the embrace of photography as a fine art but also for its documentary potential to tell complex narratives of impoverishment. We will consider the impact of the International Labor Organization; the rise of cosmopolitanism and the artists who worked and moved fluidly between Mexico, Europe, and the United States. Ultimately, the underlying thread of this class will register how the fine and popular arts made visible the expansion of the United States empire in Cuba, the Philippines, Puerto Rico, Alaska, Guam, and Hawai'i as well as the consequences of expansion for ideologies of gender, race, ethnicity, and ability.

ARTH 389 <u>Topics: Indigenous Documentary Arts</u>

(3 credits) Need Description.

ARTH 406 Native American Art II

Sec 001 CRN 79094 Fry TR 11:00-12:15 CTRART 1020

(3 credits) Offered with ARTH 506, ANTH 403 and 503. This course is the second half of a two-semester survey of historic and "traditional" Native American/First Nations art of North America. In this semester, we will examine a wide range of arts and architecture from the Plains, Plateau, Great Basin, and Southwest regions, from the archaeological past to the present. (The first semester, Native American Art I, deals with the Eastern Woodlands, Great Lakes, Prairie, Arctic and Sub-arctic, Northwest Coast, and California.) Certain themes will run throughout the course: discussions of indigenous epistemologies and aesthetic systems, the meanings and functions of art in Native societies, the limits of extant art historical and other scholarly approaches to Native visual cultures, and the myriad issues arising from intercultural contact and colonial conflict.

(Students do not have to take Native American Art History I and II in order, and may take only one of the two courses since they are not cumulative and have different cultural and geographic subject matter. Likewise, please note that this course does not deal extensively with "contemporary" works of art, which are the focus of Art History 415/515, "Modern and Contemporary Native American Art", as well as other topics courses on contemporary Native arts.)

ARTH 412 <u>Pre-Columbian Art South America</u>

Sec 001 CRN 40418 Jackson TR 11:00-12:15 CTRART 1019

(3 credits) Offered with ARTH 512 and ANTH 420 and 570. Arts of the Andean region prior to the 16th century.

ARTH 421 History of Prints II

(3 credits) Offered with ARTH 521. Printmaking, printing and artists' books from Goya to present. Including the graphic arts and photography, the rise of the ideas of the original print, 20th-century mixed media and the relationship between words and images.

20th Century Photography

Sec 001 CRN 79108

CTRART 1020

(3 credits) Offered with ARTH 526. This course examines the photography of the twentieth century. Considering both theory and practice, students will study art photography, photojournalism, and commercial and advertising photography from this era. Students will also acquire the critical and technical vocabulary needed to describe, analyze, and formulate arguments about specific photographs and the ways in which they are relevant to the socio-historical contexts from which they have emerged.

ARTH 429 <u>Topics: Visual & Sonic Landscapes</u>

Sec 001 CRN 47859 Ernest M 1:00-3:45 CTRART 1018

(3 credits) Offered with ARTH 529.001. This course offers an exploration of Indigenous moving images and soundscapes as an art form that is centered in research, land justice and heritage language revitalization. Within the context of Native art history, the course examines an overview of abstraction, experimental filmmaking, and critical Indigenous studies in relation to other disciplines and the arts. Through reading, archival alterations, sound exploration, film screenings and visiting artists we will survey approaches to visual and sonic storytelling. Opportunities to make special projects is supported by a series of in class workshops that offer research methodologies and techniques to assist students in creating short films and sound pieces as alternative forms of creative scholarship. Our key concepts include settler colonialism, decolonization, land, imagination, and memory.

ARTH 429 Topics: Ancient American Art and Curatorial Vision

Sec 002 CRN 47860 Jackson W 11:00-1:45 CTRART 1018

(3 credits) Offered with ARTH 529.002. Museum exhibitions often shape scholarly dialog and public knowledge related to visual culture. In this course, students will become familiar with key museum exhibitions of Ancient American/Pre-Columbian art staged in recent decades. Readings and discussions will allow students to examine the kinds of narratives constructed by displays of art. A hands-on component to the class allows students to research and present findings on specific objects in the Maxwell Museum collection.

ARTH 429 <u>Topics: Indigenous Documentary Arts</u>

(3 credits) Offered with ARTH 529.003. Need description.

ARTH 432 <u>Islamic Art & Architecture</u>

Sec 001 CRN 79120 Andrews TR 1:00-2:15 CTRART 1020

(3 credits) Offered with ARTH 532.. This course is an introduction to the visual culture of the Islamic world from its foundations in the 7th century on the Arabian Peninsula to its flowering under Ottoman and Mughal rule in the 17th century. The course is neither a comprehensive study of all of the arts of Islam nor a study of modern and contemporary Islamic arts. The objective of this course is to give an introduction to the foundations of Islamic arts, and expose the student to current questions and scholarship that are present in the fields of Medieval and Early Modern Islamic art.

ARTH 449 Arts of Spain

Sec 001 CRN 79123 Hernández-Durán MW 5:00-6:15 CTRART 1019

(3 credits) Offered with ARTH 549. This course will focus on the history and art of the Iberian Peninsula, or Spain, from the late medieval and early renaissance periods through the mid nineteenth century. The chronological frame of the course will thus be the early modern period, ca. 1500–1850. Familiarizing ourselves with the shifting political, cultural, and social environment of the peninsula will help us understand the arts that were produced and their significance, both, then and now. As an introduction, we will begin by briefly looking at art in Spain before 1500, i.e. from prehistory and the ancient period to the end of Roman imperial rule through the entry of Islam into the region. We will then devote the rest of the class to closely examining art production following the Christian Reconquest in the renaissance and baroque periods, the latter era considered to be the apogee of Spanish cultural development, or "Golden Age," which gave birth to artists, such as, El Greco, Diego Velázquez, Jusepe de Ribera, Bartolomé Esteban Murillo, and Francisco Goya y Lucientes. We will also look at Spain's American territories during this period and consider the role of colonialism in shaping imperial Spain's identity and development during the long early modern period. Course requirements will include: weekly readings, 2 papers, and 4 take-home exams.

Stemming from the Healing Sacred Relations Toxic Site Tour, led by Elder Kathy Sanchez of Tewa Women United, we will engage in a more in-depth/extended tour of the area to learn about the issues, the history and ongoing realities of environmental injustice, and hear stories from and work with front-line community members. Through semester-long guidance, students will create a culturally responsive, values-based, interactive, storymap of the toxic sites as a deliverable to our partners. In addition, we will create a public exhibition to share our research and artwork with the wider community.
